## The Mystic Whaler Middle School Trip

On Monday, October 3<sup>rd</sup> the Middle School took a journey on the *Mystic Whaler*, a schooner used to transport cargo up and down the Atlantic coast. We started off the cold rainy day by splitting up into groups to participate in introductory activities. Then we sailed off with Captain John and his crew as they gave us a waterside tour of the Inner Harbor. We saw the Coast Guard ship the *Eagle*, which was originally a captured Nazi warship. Additionally we saw the submarine the *Torsk*, and the skipjack *Lady Maryland*. It was interesting to see the variety of shipping life going on in the Baltimore Harbor.

Then our attention was directed to the actual ship we were sailing. We participated in a variety of nautical activities. At one station we examined a nautical map and learned about water depth, longitude, and latitude. We used a compass and caliper to measure degrees. One of the most fun parts of navigation was having the opportunity to steer the schooner with the assistance of Captain John.

During time at another station we learned how the sails are used to power the ship. We experienced raising the sails and, most important, we learned how to tie a bowline knot. Learning about how to position the sails, to tack, and to maneuver the ship was very techni-

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
